Tirthankara Sculptures – Anaimalai, Tamil Nadu

During the 9th and 10th centuries CE, Jainism thrived in the southern peninsula, leaving an indelible mark on the region's art, culture, literature, and social fabric. Anaimalai, located just 8 kilometres from Madurai, emerged as a significant center for the development of Jainism during the early Pandya period.

On the picturesque hills of Anaimalai, a remarkable collection of Jain sculptures from the 9th to 10th century CE can be found. These sculptures, including depictions of revered figures like Bhagwan Mahaveer, Parsvanatha, Bahubali, and Yakshi Ambika, were meticulously carved under the guidance of the Jain Monk Ajjanandhi. The sculptures, originally plastered and painted, have stood the test of time, preserving the rich heritage of Jainism in the region.

At the base of these sculptures, inscriptions in ancient scripts such as "Tamil," "Grantha," and "Vatteluthu" have been discovered, shedding light on the historical and cultural context of these artworks. Additionally, remnants of paintings can still be seen on these sculptures, offering a glimpse into the vibrant artistic traditions of the time.

This collection of Tirthankara sculptures in Anaimalai stands as a testament to the deep-rooted influence of Jainism in the southern peninsula and serves as a captivating reminder of the region's cultural and religious heritage.

The Bhagwan Mahaveer Foundation was established in 1994 by Shri N.Sugalchand Jain under the Chairmanship of Bharat Ratna Late Shri C.Subrananiam. The Foundation identifies, encourages and honours individuals and institutions who are doing selfless service for the underprivileged in our society.

Mahaveer Awards

The Bhagwan Mahaveer Foundation instituted Mahaveer Awards in 1995. The Awards are given for excellence in human endeavour in the following fields

- Non-Violence & Vegetarianism,
- Education,
- Medicine,
- Community & Social Service

This is an annual Award. The awards carry a cash component of Rs.10 Lakhs each with a memento and a citation.

Initially the Foundation instituted one award under the category Community & Social Service. Gradually, the number of awards increased from 1 to 4 over the years and the total cash component of the award from ₹ 5 Lakh to ₹ 40 Lakh. If the nomination received in a particular year, for a certain category does not meet the expected standards, then the awards in that category are not presented.

Nominations in the prescribed format are invited from district administrators, legislators, bureaucrats, educationists, media, social workers, parliamentarians and other eminent people. The received nominations are submitted to the Shortlisting Committee who prepare a shortlist of the nominations. The shortlisted nominees are visited to ascertain the overall genuineness and the positive impact of services rendered by the nominees.

The shortlisted nominations and visit reports are placed before the Selection Jury, which is headed by Justice Shri M N Venkatachaliah, Former Chief Justice of India who evaluate and decide the awardees. The awards are presented by eminent personalities like the President of India, Vice President, Governors, Chief Minister, Ministers etc in formal functions.

Till now 88 Awards covering 23 States and 1 Union Territory have been presented.

Step 4

The shortlisted nominees and visit reports are placed before the Selection Jury, headed by Justice Shri M N Venkatachaliah, Former Chief Justice of India who evaluate and decide the awardees

Step 5

The awards are presented to the Awardees by eminent personalities like the President of India, Vice President, Governors, Chief Minister, Ministers etc in formal functions.

Dhyan Foundation, New Delhi Non-Violence & Vegetarianism

Dhyan Foundation, since its establishment in 2002, has been actively engaged in animal welfare, providing food, shelter, treatment to the voiceless and saving them from illegal and inhumane transport and slaughter. Currently it is caring for over 70,000 animals including cows, bulls, buffaloes, camels, goats, sheep, horses, dogs, cats, rabbits etc and managing over 43 animal shelters and gaushalas across India.It also works with India's Border Security Force to put an end to illegal crossborder cattle smuggling.

Dhyan Foundation started animal welfare initiatives like 'save a cow', 'feed a dog', 'help a monkey' and 'befriend a bird' etc. Through online social media platforms, it shares valuable information on how to care for street animals, how to build temporary shelters, provide for them during extreme weather conditions and so on. Their website also has a page on India's animal welfare laws that can help animal lovers legally fight injustice and inhumane treatment of animals. It is operating 10 ambulances in Bhuvneshwar, Delhi, Goa, Kochi and Mumbai.

The activities of Dhyan Foundation are managed by volunteers from all walks of life, like journalists, doctors, designers, lawyers, students, home-makers, businessmen and businesswomen.

Dhyan Foundation also organizes Sanatan Kriya sessions, teachings on ancient sciences of spiritual healing, vedic chants etc in many parts of the world. Dhyan Foundation publishes a monthly journal "The Inner World" that covers topics ranging from ayurveda, health and beauty, travel, vaastu, mystical musings, and highlights the rich culture of our country.



Friends of Tribals Society, West Bengal Education

Friends of Tribals society, a volunteer organization, was established in 1989 under the apex body Ekal Abhiyan Trust. Friends of Tribals Society is working to give non-formal basic education to children from a very young age of 4 years residing in rural and tribal villages of India. The society operates one-teacher schools, called the Ekal Schools, in the villages, led by trained members of the local community.

The society has established more than 1.02 lakh Ekal Schools in the rural and tribal areas. More than 26 lakh children are currently studying in Ekal Vidyalayas. The aim is to reduce school drop outs by linking children to formal education. The school curriculum covers reading, writing, arithmetic, general knowledge, basic science, health and hygiene awareness, moral education, local sports, craft and creativity.

The Ekal schools are run in chaupal, under a tree, in village courtyard or at teacher's home, as per the availability of space, season and climate. A local educated youth, preferably a lady, from the same village is appointed as a teacher by the Gram Samiti. The idea is to make village community take ownership of the Vidyalaya and ensure its smooth running and further the social transformation through the Vidyalaya. The selected teachers are imparted induction teaching training and undergo monthly revision and periodical refresher trainings.

Friends of Tribals Society has a massive volunteer base of teachers and volunteers. They are supported by communities through committees set up right from the village level to the national level. The entire village participates in its activities to provide education to the children.



Jan Swasthya Sahyog, Chhattisgarh Medicine

Jan Swasthya Sahyog was founded in 1996 in Bilaspur, Chhattisgarh by a group of 10 qualified doctors from the All India Institute of Medical Sciences, Delhi, who dedicated their services for the care of the underserved people. The JSS provides affordable healthcare which is easily accessible to the rural tribal communities. Comprehensive healthcare is provided through a 3-tier system consisting of Village Health Workers at the first tier, providing door to door care and primary healthcare. It is catering to a population of 41000 residing in 72 villages, out of which 67% are vulnerable tribal groups.

In the second tier, three village outposts/subcentres are set up catering to the needs of 25-30 hamlets each. The centres are managed by trained Senior Health Workers and nurses which provide daily outpatient consultations, investigations. A doctor led mobile clinic is also attached to it. Tertiary care is provided in its 100 bed referral hospital in Ganiyari village which provides advanced care and surgical interventions. It is equipped with facilities and has been providing low cost care to 390,000 patients from over 2500 villages of Chhattisgarh and adjoining districts of Madhya Pradesh. Over 50,000 people have received surgical and obstetric care and over 29000 have been admitted and treated for serious illnesses.

It is running a nursing school for tribal and Dalit girls, a DNB programme for General Surgery and Family Medicine, rural creches for children under 3, facilitating formation of SHGs of women to empower themselves. JSS also conducts agriculture and animal health programs and provides de-addiction facilities. For the last 22 years, it has been providing high quality care at a very low cost to the poor tribals with empathy and has gained the trust of the community.



Nongstoin Social Service Society, Meghalaya Community & Social Service

Nongstoin Social Service Society, established in 2007, is providing services in Khasi and Garo Hills of Meghalaya. It is providing support, guidance, training in life skills and good farming practices and brings about a difference in the lives of the underprivileged and marginalized people through economic empowerment, mainstreaming children, women and persons/children with disabilities by skill training for youth, creating awareness about their rights and assist them in obtaining their entitlement. NSSS provides health care and works for eradication of malaria and tuberculosis in the area.


NSSS operates two CHILDLINE Centers, working closely with District Child Protection Officer, Police Department, Social Welfare Department, Health Department and Educational Institution, extending care and rehabilitation to various vulnerable children such as abused children, child labour, children in conflict with Law, HIV/AIDS affected children, substance addicted children and special-abled children and others.

It has assisted about 39000 children in difficult and different circumstances. It is facilitating agriculture regeneration measures and promoting integrated farming system to 40 villages and 1000 farmers directly leading to transfer of technical know-how, efficient usage of bio-pesticides & bio-nutrients which has improved productivity and production. It is helping farmers to access market facilities.

It has set up Herbal Medicinal School, managed by people of Sohparu village for conservation and preservation of the good traditional practices. It provides Rehabilitation for Persons with Disabilities in 28 villages of Nongstoin and 2 villages of Mawthadraishan and helps in getting their entitlement such as, Chief Minister's Pension Scheme etc. It provides much needed services in difficult terrain and far flung habitations.

Establishment of Charitable Institutions:

Singhvi Charitable Trust: Estd in 1974

The Singhvi Charitable Trust helps the deserving and assists the underprivileged of our society with special focus on health care. The Trust started conducting free dental, eye and health camps in remote rural areas of Chennai that lack medical facilities. The Trust continues to conduct the camps for the past 30 years. The activities done by the Trust are as follows

1. Camps in rural areas:

a. In Chennai: The Trust organises and conducts dental, eye and health camps every Sunday in rural areas which have poor accessibility to health care. Since inception till October 2023, the Trust has conducted 1044 rural camps. Free medicines, spectacles and food are distributed to the patients.

b. In Pali district: The Trust started conducting regular medical camps in the villages of Pali district, to name a few, Siyat, Phulad, jojawar, Nana, Jadan, Kantaliya, Sevari, Magartalb, Begari, Bhimana. About 50 camps have been organised.

2. In-house camps:

The Trust conducts daily in-house camps at Singhvi Scan and Diagnostic Centre, Chennai. Till October 2023, the Trust has conducted 4913 in-house camps.

3. Assistance for heart surgery:

Since 2001, Singhvi Charitable Trust provides assistance to poor and needy to undergo heart surgery. A sum of Rs.10000 is given for the purpose. Till October 2023, the Trust has provided assistance to 1712 needy people for undergoing heart surgeries. Singhvi Charitable Trust provides assistance on need basis to the poor people to undergo medical treatment, give medicines etc. Amount of Rs. 5.55 lakhs has been given to poor patients till Oct 2023.

4. Pension to needy Jains:

The Trust provides monthly pension to needy Jains, specially in Rajasthan and Chennai. Till Oct 2023, the Trust has provided pension worth Rs.389 lakhs to 2319 needy destitute. 5. The Singhvi Scan and Diagnostic Centre is functioning in Triplicane, Chennai. The Centre is providing quality and reliable pathological laboratory service at most affordable cost.

6. Creation and donation of infrastructure to various institutions:

- f. Smt.Jadavbai Nathmal Singhvee Glaucoma Service to Sankara Nethralaya, Chenna



The Singhvi Charitable Trust built Mahaveer Ashray, a state-of-the-art Palliative Care Centre in Smt. Chandrabai Singhvi Campus in 2017 in Sriperumbudur. It was handed over to Cancer Institute (WIA), Adyar on 22nd June, 2017. It is the unit of Cancer Institute, Adyar.

The Mahaveer Ashray was inaugurated by Shri Narendra Modi, Honourable Prime Minister of India on 12/04/2018.

The Ashray, situated in 5 acres of land is 50 bed care centre housed in a well-planned aesthetic building with equipment, furniture and patient-comfort ambience. The Ashray focuses on diminishing the pain of the terminally ill patients, relieve sufferings of the inmates and assist them to spend their remaining days with dignity and comfort. It meets the urgent need of the terminally ill persons.

Jinendra Jeevdaya Kendra, Uthukottai, Chennai

Shri Sugalchand Jain founded People for Animals, Chennai in 1995 to champion the cause of animals. An animal welfare shelter was being run in a 3.5 acres land for the about 20 years taking care of abandoned and stray animals. As the number of inmates and number welfare programmes were increasing, Shri Sugalchand felt the need to establish a bigger Centre. He has given 18.4 acres of land in Uthukottai, near Chennai, and constructed a big, comfortable animal shelter, Jinendra Jeevdaya Kendra which has a wonderful ambience for the animals to spend rest of their lives peacefully surrounded by nature. It homes more than 1000 animals – cattle, pigs, horses, monkeys, cats, dogs, sheep, mules and goats rescued from the clutches of a cruel death or human abuse, or illegal slaughter or abandoned by heartless owners.



Pigeon Feeding

The Singhvi Charitable Trust, Triplicane is feeding around 12000 pigeons everyday in the open terrace of Singhvi Scan & Diagnostic Center for the past 20 years. 250 kgs of wheat (5 bags of wheat) is spread everyday in the morning. The Trust has so far spent Rs.2.11 crores for feeding birds.

1. SJNS Jain Group Of Schools

The Vidhya Jyothi Trust runs 2 primary schools and 1 higher secondary school in Chennai in the name of SJNS Jain Group of Schools. The schools are providing quality education to less privileged children since the year 1984. The Schools are providing education from classes L.K.G to XII in English Medium.

The Schools are full-fledged operational schools with sound infrastructure and a dedicated and qualified Teaching Staff. Apart from having 100% success rates in the examinations, the school ensures that the students also be given value based education. There are 1200 students studying in the schools.



2. MITS Mahaveer Institute of Technology & Science

Mahaveer Institute of Technology & Science offers B.Tech. in Computer Science, Civil & Mechanical and is affiliated to Bikaner Technical University for the program. The first batch that passed out earlier in session 2017-18 was affiliated to Rajasthan Technical University, had the highest pass percentage of 93.6% in Rajasthan in the University exams.



MITS Science Arts & Commerce College started in session 2018-19 is affiliated to Jai Narain Vyas University, Jodhpur The college is the first English medium college in the region. Special emphasis is laid on communication and over all grooming of the students. Students are also encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities. The programs offered are B.Sc.(PCM), B.Sc.(CBZ), B.Com, B.A. & B.C.A.



MITS Group of Institutions have become a brand synonymous with quality affordable education in the region.

Other activities of the Trust are:

- 1. Provide scholarship to deserving students
- 2. Smt. Chandrabai Computer Literacy Programme:

Vidhya Jyothi Trust launched an initiative to provide computer literacy programme to rural students of Pali district of Rajasthan in December 2016. Trained professionals carry laptop to government schools in villages like Dhakdi, Bagawas, Indra Nagar, Dudhod, Kharia Soda, Khardi, Malpuriyaand take classes on computer literacy. Since inception, the programme is effectively conducted for students studying in classes 5 to 8 in 26 schools benefitting 1825 students.
